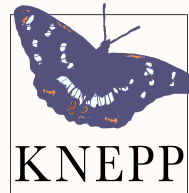

In this edition of *News from Knepp*: an **extraordinary year for butterflies** and insects at Knepp; the **Market Garden's bounty** fills the Knepp Wilding Kitchen menu; **tomato tasting**; and **Isabella Tree's TED talk** - coming soon

The Great Butterfly Summer of 2025

This summer is one for the history books. We have counted more **purple emperors** than ever before at Knepp – 283 in a single day, indicating many hundreds across the Wildland.

Butterfly expert Neil Hulme estimates we may have as many as 100,000 **purple hairstreaks** (pictured above).



Last chance to Join a *Butterfly Safari*

We've recorded the **large tortoiseshell** again, too - a butterfly officially listed as extinct in Britain but first found breeding at Knepp in 2022.

And we've spotted **wall brown** butterflies along our Adur river restoration in recent weeks. This is only the second time they've been seen at Knepp since 1970.





Insect expert Graeme Lyons clocked up 242 species in one day – his best ever day at Knepp – including *Hypseloecus visci*, a beetle never seen in Sussex before (pictured).

Wilding Kitchen Menu Brims with *Market Garden* Produce



With our Market Garden at peak production, we're in the joyful season where almost all herbs, salads and vegetables on the **Knepp Wilding Kitchen** menu have come from Knepp.

You can also buy freshly-picked Market Garden produce at the Wilding Shop every day of the week, and on **Harvest Fridays, between 2 and 4pm**, our pickers pile up the veg stand so you can stock up for the weekend.

The summer bounty includes salad leaves, courgettes, sugar snap peas, salad cucumbers, red onions, garlic, beetroot, chillies and...tomatoes.

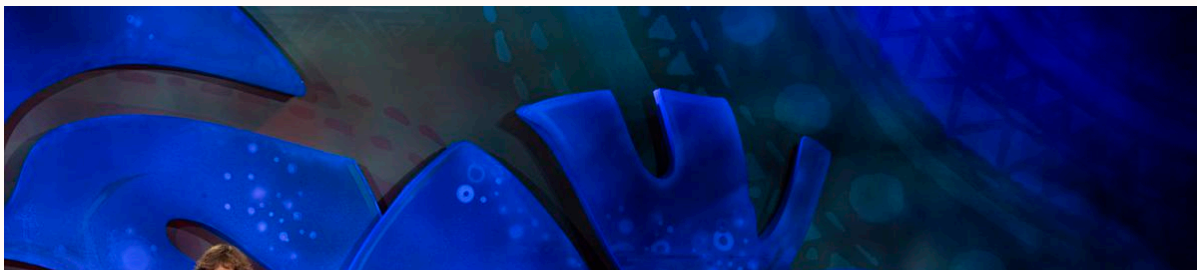

Knepp's co-owner Isabella Tree shared her top tips for rewilding at TED's recent Countdown Climate conference in Nairobi.

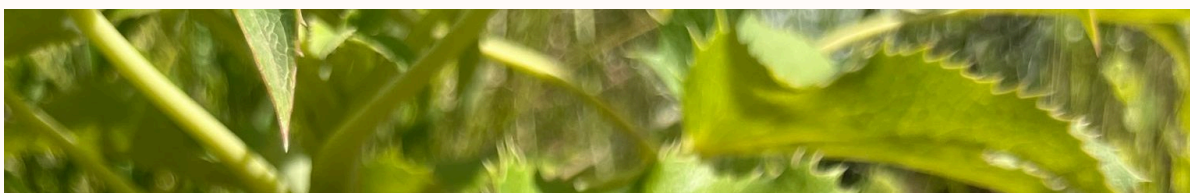

Moy's June blog from the *rewilded Walled Garden*



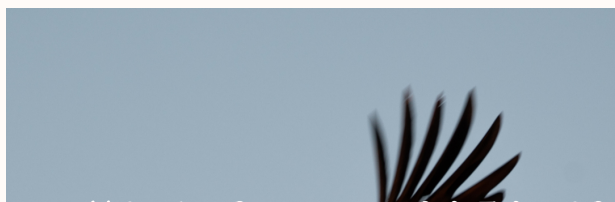

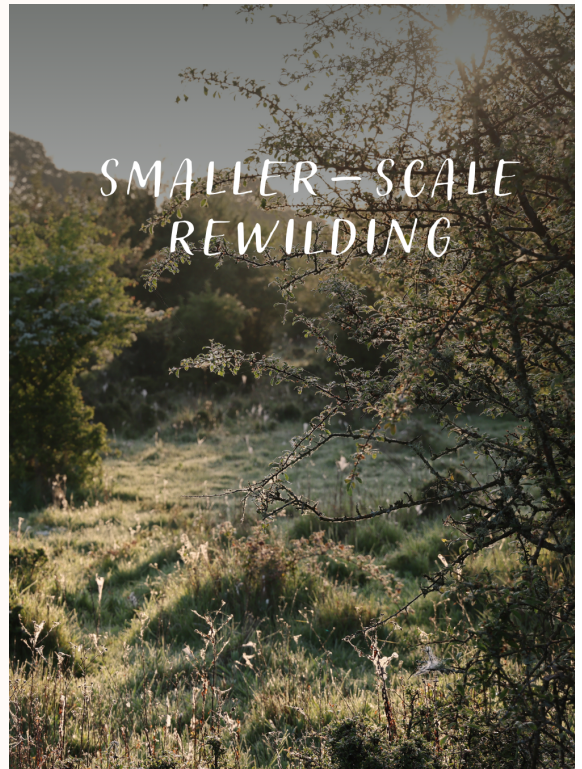
