Dear ,

As July draws to a close, and August stretches before us, we are getting ready to say goodbye to our summer visitors. Many Cuckoos are already back in Africa, whilst the Swifts will be leaving shortly, and our newly-fledged Ospreys will start heading off in mid-August, taking on their first migration journey.

Even as we bid them adieu, there's still plenty of wildlife to see and admire around our two counties. Plus, we have lots of events where you can join experts on guided walks, family activities and, of course, Osprey cruises.

Osprey season update

July has brought both moments of joy and sadness for the Rutland Osprey Project.

The month began with the exciting news that we had our first fledgling of the season. After a period of helicoptering and wing-strengthening, our eldest chick female 3R5, took her first flight on the 2nd July. The next day saw two more successful fledgings, with 3R7 taking to the skies first, followed closely by 3R6. With his siblings airborne, the youngest chick, 3R8, suddenly had a little more space on the nest.

Sadly, however, we experienced a tragic event just a few days later. On the evening of the 6th July, during wet and stormy weather, 3R6 was seen leaving the nest at 21:31. Shortly afterwards, a splash was heard from the live camera, and at 21:41 Maya was observed flying from the nest while 3R6 could be seen swimming towards the shoreline. At that time, 3R8 had not yet fledged, and any attempt to intervene risked prematurely flushing him from the nest before he was strong enough to fly. With the wet conditions ongoing, an immediate response was not possible without potentially endangering the other chicks.

At first light the following morning, Tim Mackrill searched the area and sadly found 3R6 dead on the shoreline, with a wound on the left side of his neck. Thanks to the support of Oakham Veterinary Hospital, we've been able to rule out any foul play, and we are now awaiting results from a post-mortem examination for further insight. Fledging is a critical and often perilous stage in

an osprey's life, and unfortunately, complications can occur despite our best efforts.

We're incredibly grateful for the outpouring of support and kind messages we've received during this difficult time. Your encouragement means a great deal to the entire team.

In more uplifting news, 3R8 fledged successfully on 8th July. After a morning of helicoptering and building confidence, we received word from a volunteer at our Waderscrape hide that he had taken his first flight. Since then, all three fledglings - 3R5, 3R7, and 3R8 - have continued to grow in confidence, honing their flight skills and even practising dives to clean their talons in the water.

Now that all the chicks have fledged, we're beginning to see the nest empty for longer stretches, a bittersweet sign that they're becoming more independent. The fledglings will remain in the area and won't stray far from the Manton Bay nest until mid-August. At around that point, they will begin to depart one by one and start their remarkable journey south on migration to West Africa.



Restoring the Soar




In partnership with Leicester City Council and the Canal & River Trust we are joining forces to improve the urban stretch of the river that runs through our city. We are combining our expertise in waterway and habitat

management, landscape design, and community engagement to look for new ways to involve everyone in making the area a better place for all. As a Trust, we've been actively engaging with communities along the catchment to understand their hopes for the river, its wildlife, and local people.

It's been a busy events season, with fantastic interest across the city. A highlight is our new art exhibition at Bitsy's Emporium of Awesome, featuring creative responses from Leicester College Art and Design students. Their work brings the river into focus through photography, print ceramics, textiles, and more.

The exhibition is open throughout the summer and is well worth a visit.



We've also been connecting with residents of the new Waterside development through green initiatives - making seed balls for gardens and upcycling pallets into planters.

We're enthusiastic about developing these relationships and supporting the community's bigger ideas for strengthening their connection to nature and the river.






These are just a few of the ways we're building meaningful connections to explore how people can better engage with the river and its catchment.

At the start of July, we recorded 86 glowing female and 8 male Glow Worm at our Ketton Quarry Nature Reserve - a record count in Rutland for female on any one site!

“The thriving glow worm population at the nature reserve is just one example of how careful habitat management can benefit a whole unseen, delicate ecosystem and increase the biodiversity and natural value of a once industrial landscape,” says Sarah Bedford, our Senior Reserve Officer who looks after Ketton Quarry.


Book of the month
